Statistical Data Report for June 2016, Released August 2016

Regional and State Unemployment (seasonally adjusted)

Unemployment rates were significantly higher in June in six states, lower in one state, and stable in 43 states and the District of Columbia, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. Sixteen states and the District had notable unemployment rate decreases from a year earlier, two states had increases, and 32 states had no significant change.

In June, no region had an unemployment rate significantly different from the U.S. rate of 4.9 percent. Over the month, the West had the only statistically significant unemployment rate change (+0.1 percentage point). Significant over-the-year rate decreases occurred in three regions: the South and West (-0.6 percentage point each) and Northeast (-0.5 point).





Online Labor Demand

Online advertised vacancies decreased 226,700 to 4,657,500 in June, according to **The Conference Board Help Wanted OnLine® (HWOL) Data Series** released. The May Supply/Demand rate stands at 1.52 unemployed for each advertised vacancy with a total of 2.6 million more unemployed workers than the number of advertised vacancies. The number of unemployed was around 7.4 million in May.

In June, the Professional category saw losses in all major occupational categories with the largest losses in Management (-24.1), Business/Finance (-21.3), and Computer/Math (-34.8). The Services/Production category saw large losses in Sales (-26.3), Office/Admin (-33.1), and Installation/Repair (-13.4); other categories showed only small gains and losses. (BLS Daily Report)


Gross Domestic Product

Gross domestic product, the broadest measure of goods and services produced across the U.S., grew at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.2% in the second quarter, the Commerce Department said. . The gain marks only a slight acceleration from the first quarter, when GDP advanced at a downwardly revised 0.8% pace. The first quarter was previously seen as increasing 1.1% from the prior period. The major drags in the second quarter were plunging business spending and excess inventories. The low number came despite resilient consumer behavior in the spring, as household spending rose at an annualized rate of 4.2 percent. The economy has grown at less than a 2% pace for three straight quarters. (BLS Daily Report)

Median Weekly Earnings

From the second quarter of 2015 to the second quarter of 2016, median usual weekly earnings increased 2.6 percent for men who usually worked full time and 2.5 percent for women. In the second quarter of 2016, women who usually worked full time had median weekly earnings of \$744, or 81.8 percent of the \$909 median for men. Among the major race and ethnicity groups, median weekly earnings for full-time wage and salary workers were \$854 for Whites in the second quarter of 2016, \$677 for Blacks or African Americans, \$1,021 for Asians, and \$618 for workers of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity.


